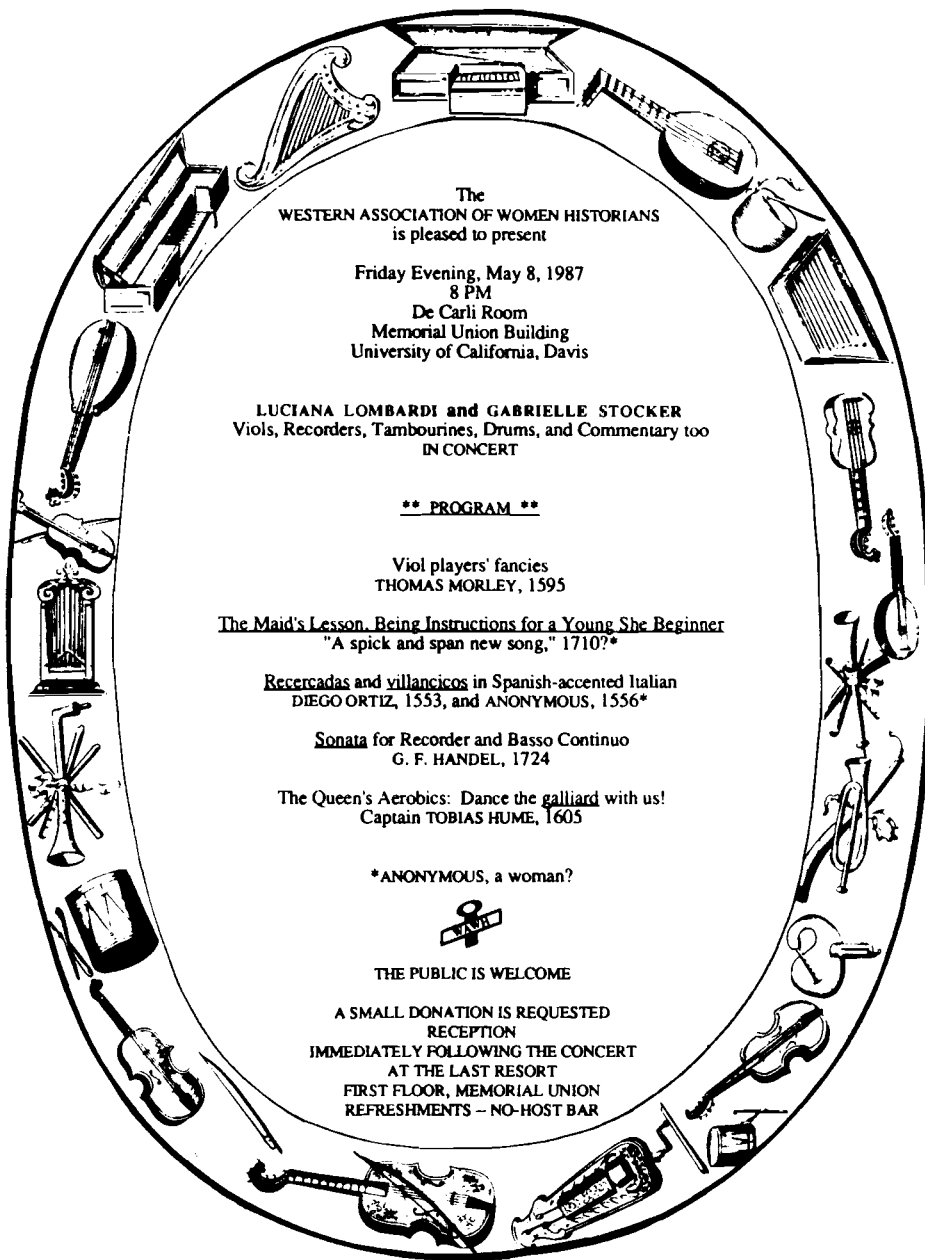

For the first time in its history, the WAWH will meet at the University of California, Davis. All sessions and special events will be held on the second floor of the MEMORIAL UNION BUILDING of the University of California, Davis.

DRIVING: Davis is on Interstate 80, fifteen miles west of Sacramento and seventy miles east of San Francisco. There are exits from I-80 (marked "University of California, Davis") which will take you directly onto campus.

PARKING: Lots 11 and 12, off A Street. See enclosed map.

AIR SERVICE: Davis is twenty-five minutes from the Sacramento Metropolitan Airport. All major airlines fly into Sacramento, including PSA, AirCal, United, American and Western.
